UN Human Rights Director, Mr. Marcel Akpovo, Engages in the Human Right Day Commemoration Events During a Visit to Tanzania.

On December 7, 2023, Mr. Marcel Akpovo, the Director and Regional Representative of UN Human Rights EARO, accompanied by UN delegates, visited the LHRC Legal Aid Clinic in Kinondoni, Dar es Salaam. Dr. Anna Henga, the Executive Director of the Legal and Human Rights Centre, led this important engagement.

During this visit, the delegates had an opportunity to share experience and discuss human rights development in Tanzania as well as coverage of LHRC work. Discussions included topics such as the Legal Aid Management System (LAMS), access to justice, family law, litigation, and juvenile cases. Additionally, the UN delegates had the opportunity to explore various units within the clinic.

Mr. Marcel Akpovo and the UN delegates also convened with Tanzania's senior editors at the Seashells Millennium Hotel in Dar es Salaam on December 7, 2023. This meeting was instrumental in discussing critical issues, including human rights violations, matters within the realm of criminal justice, and the paramount importance of safeguarding freedom of expression.

Furthermore, Mr. Akpovo was honored as a guest at LHRC's commemoration event for the 75th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) and International Human Rights Day, which was hosted on December 8, 2023.

December 2023



On December 8, 2023, the Legal and Human Rights Centre (LHRC) commemorated International Human Rights Day and the 75th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) at the Johani Rotana Hotel in Dar es Salaam.

The Executive Director of LHRC, Dr. Anna Henga, inaugurated the conference which was attended by various stakeholders, including ambassadors, government officials, paralegals and other civil society.

The Director and Regional Representative of UN Human Rights EARO, Mr. Marcel Akpovor highlighted the trend of human rights over the years and expounded on challenges facing women.

"More than 1 billion women face various forms of gender-based violence. Therefore, as a nation, we need advocacy organizations to create systems that protect women against gender-based violence,"emphasized Akpovor.

Former Executive Director of LHRC, Dr. Helen Kijo-Bisimba mentioned that Tanzania signed the Declaration of Human Rights immediately upon gaining independence.

It was noted that at that time, the country did not have effective systems for human rights management. For example, there were only two government-owned media outlets, but later on the country saw an increase of media.

This expansion provided the country with an opportunity to discuss human rights and start endorsing declarations on human rights.

Retired Judge Mathew Pauwa Mhina Mwaimu, Chairman of the Commission for Human Rights and Good Governance (CHRAGG),

mentioned the steps we have taken as a country in advocating for human rights, including having human rights monitoring centers, the existence of social organizations advocating for human rights and the government using security agencies to protect citizens.

It was noted that there is still a need to continue to educate the population on the understanding of human rights.

"There's a significant challenge regarding understanding human rights. When someone advocates for them, they're often labeled an activist, which carries negative connotations," said Tom Nyanduga Bahame Vice-Rector for Administrative, Institutional, and Cooperation Issues "We should recognize that human rights are for everyone." emphasized Bahame

The UN Resident Coordinator in Tanzania, Zlatan Milišić, said that the United Nations Human Rights Treaty remains the foundation of human rights and a guide for advocating for human rights.

"The United Nations agency in Tanzania provides recommendations to the government and various institutions overseeing and advocating for human rights to ensure that human rights laws adhere to international laws on human rights," emphasized Milišić.

On the other hand, the gender officer at the Tanzania Association for the Deaf (CHAVITA), Lupi Mwaisaka mentioned that the assessment of 75 years of human rights in Tanzania shows that there are still challenges for people with disabilities; they continue to face oppression and lack of dignity.

Nevertheless, efforts undertaken by organizations such as LHRC have started to bear fruit.

"Now, Tanzania has ratified the treaty on the rights of persons with disabilities, and we've seen them beginning to get leadership positions, being protected, and their dignity being cared for," said Lupi Mwaisaka

During the commemoration, LHRC honored those who have made significant strides in advocating for and upholding fundamental human rights within their respective domains.
